### Principal's Report

It was a joy to greet so many alumni and their families at the inaugural Alumni Community Day on Sunday, 24 March. Students returned to the Dalton Road Campus for the commencement of Term 2 looking splendid in their winter uniform, which included quite a number of our girls in the brand new addition to the uniform – trousers. This term has a great deal to offer our students. Co-curricular programs continue to be a huge part of DRC and the students happily attend activities held at the beginning and end of day and during lunchtime. Students confidently discuss their activity and conversations include words such as STEAM, Art Club, Debating, Public Speaking and lots more. In addition to all the wonderful sport events, it is delightful to see how interested students are in these programs as well. Rehearsals are at an optimum at the moment for so many Performing Arts activities including Generations In Jazz, Monicans in May, Dance Showcase and of course the most highly anticipated GREASE. Student commitment to these and other activities are a pleasure to observe. I thank parents for supporting your child with the early morning drop offs and late afternoon pick-ups, knowing so well how much your child gains from these opportunities.

#### Deputy Principal's Report

### **Innovation & ICT Leader**



Much is being made of 'screen time' in the media. I can still remember a time when this used to refer to how much television students watched, and I was often advising parents on how to manage TV in relation to homework. Now, screen time largely refers to the time people spend on the mobile phones, laptops and tablets. About mobile phones, they are hardly used as phones anyhow – we have apps for that now e.g. WhatsApp, Viber and the like. Instant messaging has displaced emails; indeed, email is the new 'snail mail'. So, what is important in a mobile device is how much data it can hold, 64gb – 128gb seems to be the standard these days; the processor speed; the camera quality and so on. I think I am stating the obvious when I say that mobile phones are really mini-computers which can wirelessly connect to news, social media and virtually anything that is available online.

Of course, St Monica's College encourages a different kind of screen time, that spent on educational activities at school and home on the College owned and provided Notebook. So, when we come to look at how much screen time is good, bad or indifferent, it pays to be able to differentiate in respect to what activities take place with the 'screens. As parents and teachers, we must all share a responsibility in educating our young people in the wise use of mobile devices. Our approach needs to be slightly more sophisticated than the ham-fisted removal of the device. At the same time, our students need to treat technology as a means and not just an end. So, passing the hours on Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat and the like is simply a waste of time when it is done for long periods of time. Sometimes, this reaches the point of obsession when we hear of stories of young people on their mobile devices through all hours of night! So, let's take time to discuss the use of these devices with our young people. Let's encourage them to use screen time to truly connect with our world – it is sometimes surprising to learn that despite students having mobile phones so many of them are so disconnected to current events. This is a concern because technology should be supporting connection and communication with each other and the events of the world not aiding a turning in on one's self in self-absorbed personal communications.

#### 26 YEARS OF THE TAKADA HOMESTAY **EXCHANGE PROGRAM**

We had a successful visit of 22 students and two staff from Takada Junior and Senior High School in March. Now, we are preparing for our trip to Japan 14 - 27 September. We currently have ten students signed up and the invitation is open to more. Cost is \$2800 inclusive of return airfares, travel insurance as well as activities and excursions. Students stay with a Japanese family and learn first hand about the life and culture of Japan. To confirm booking, full payment must be received no later than 28 July. #### 5. Take regular breaks

You cannot work solidly for 8 hours. In fact, it is very hard to work in a concentrated way for more than about an hour.

#### 6. Know your exam

Make sure that you have spoken with your teachers about the exam and if possible look at some past papers.

I look forward to this year with great hopes and that every student achieves exactly what they require for their chosen pathways.



### **Property and Planning**





As a College we continue to work feverishly and collaboratively on our building projects and maintenance program to ensure all students and staff have the most contemporary and efficient facilities available. In the first three months of 2019 the College's maintenance staff responded to over 300 requests for a range of issues including cooling problems, plumbing, movement of items and many other maintenance issues.

With two major projects happening and many in the planning pipeline below is a small snapshot of our progress:

#### **HORIZONS PROJECT**

The new HORIZONS classrooms have opened to students and staff after final preparations were completed during the holidays. These classrooms are brand new with operable class doors in between, new touch screen technology for presentations, a range of flexible furniture, wonderful natural light and exciting views of the Wetlands. There is still a magnificent deck to be added to the external creating in and outside learning areas for the students.

The classrooms were created by the College's Property Department and some preferred contractors. This area will be officially opened to the Community in June 2019.









#### DAVISSON STREET – TEACHING, LEARNING AND ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The new Teaching and Learning facility at the College is almost near completion. Construction company MelbCon are working tirelessly to finish by mid-June. Recently all of the external cladding and glass walls were installed giving the building a prominent position in the Epping skyline. The final internal fit offs and furniture installation will occur in the coming months as will the sensational landscaping.

I thank the College community for their patience as the project has been progressing and we look forward to all students and staff using the facility from the beginning of Term 3.

### Values Education

'Our School of Many Colors' sees blue and gold come through our gates each day. These colours are worn with pride by all students as a symbol of unity and shared identity; we are all Monicans and everyone is welcomed into our community. Our College celebrates its diversity of cultures and the many nations from which we all come by embracing what our stories give to our school.

In February, we were privileged and honoured to welcome to our College Sister Anna Warlow sgs, who journeyed from Western Australia, and Sister Val Deakin sgs. The faces of our Immersion students from 2016 and 2018 lit up as they reminisced about their time on pilgrimage and memories of the vast red deserts, the blue sky on the parched earth, the dark night sky with the flickers of silver stars in the distance and faces of the people of Western Australia.

Later in Term 1, orange, the colour which signifies social communication and meaningful relationships, filled out libraries during Harmony Day and Cultural Diversity Week to support cultural diversity and an inclusive Australia. Our cultural diversity is one of our greatest strengths and is at the heart of who we are; from the oldest continuous culture of our first Australians to the cultures of our newest arrivals from around the world.

Our students enjoyed learning the craft of origami from our Takada visitors, lantern making and henna art. Some tried their hand at games like Jenga, Chinese Checkers and Backgammon and learnt about the origins of these games; Interfaith students welcomed Al Siraat College and Thomastown Secondary College and staff practised the ancient meditation of yoga. College Conversations engaged staff members to learn about Sikh culture from the Khalsa Community and alumnus Kirtan Singh (2016) spoke about his experiences at St Monica's College. This reinforced our commitment to embracing our cultural diversity and the value we place on offering hospitality to visitors to our College.

## Principal's Term 2 Assembly Address

Miss Harris, Staff and Students of St Monica's College, Epping.

The lyrics, 'We come from many places and sing in one voice, the heart of our community for all to rejoice' is familiar to each of us Monicans. Indeed, we have just heard these words in our College song.

In our School of Many Colors, one fact needs to make us very proud. Our family cultures are so varied and yet we each find a safe school, a second home-away-from home at St Monica's College. Each of us deserves to be proud of the peace, understanding and harmony we live by as we grow together as Monicans.

In the early days of our school, the Sisters of the Good Samaritan only educated girls here, those girls were mainly from Australian families going back several generations, those first students came from just a few northern suburbs, and they learnt only the English language at school.

As time went forward and Melbourne changed, immigration increased, refugees and boat people were accepted in greater numbers into Australia, and Governments encouraged what was called multiculturalism in society. St Monica's College also changed.

In 1978, boys were invited into the College by the Sisters and the girls, students came from wider afield as suburbs such as Mill Park, Craigieburn and South Morang grew in numbers, and Languages other than English were introduced into the curriculum – now we have the opportunity to learn Italian, Spanish, Japanese, Greek and French.

Our School of Many Colors is rich with many cultures represented in this Sports and Assembly Hall this morning. What is your own family heritage and nationality? Australians we have many; Italians were the first foreign students joining the girls after 1964; Greek and Macedonian families moved into Lalor and Thomastown and sent their children to SMC; Lebanese numbers are always growing; and a vast array of students from a vast number of Asian cultures sit here this morning. Families from the Pacific regions are moving into the north of Melbourne and into SMC, African cultures are strongly represented at our school, and Spanish speaking students are in all classes as well as Monicans whose heritage is Indian, Polish, Croatian, and even American. There are many others.

We could be a racial horror school with national grudges being borne, ancient cultural hatred being played out on Australian and Monican soil, racial discrimination, cruel exploitation of refugees, whole communities being condemned for the stupid and often evil acts of a few. However, we are not like that in this School of Many Colors and we ought to be a shining beacon for the people of Australia to admire and praise.

Fly with me for the next few minutes to experience the colors of celebration in countries from which so many of your families come. Colors make us happy, excite us, brighten our mood and represent the vibrancy of countries in all corners of the world.

First landing is... I-N-D-I-A

Holi is a popular ancient festival originating in India. Holi is known as the 'festival of spring', the festival of colors', and often as the 'festival of love'. It is celebrated in almost every part of India and it lasts a day and a night. The vibrancy of colors is something that brings a lot of positivity and this famous Hindu festival is celebrated with utmost joy and enthusiasm.

Bonfires are lit; people smear themselves with colors and play with water-filled toy guns and balloons. A great time is celebrated in India, represented by many Monicans in Our School of Many Colors.

To: V-I-E-T-N-A-M

Tet occurs in the Vietnamese New Year and is the most important festival in the Vietnamese culture. It translates to 'Feast of the First Morning of the First Day'. It is celebrated annually and takes place from the first day of the first month of the calendar year until at least the third day. During Tet, there is special cooking, house visits, New Year greetings, giving lucky money to children and many other traditions. It is a joyful time with people going onto streets trying to make as much noise as possible using firecrackers, drums, gongs, and there are parades with people wearing different masks, plus people hidden under the mysterious Mua Lan, an animal resembling somewhere between a lion and a dragon.

Red envelopes are given to the young children by the elderly. In Vietnamese towns, and possibly by many Vietnamese Monicans, houses are decorated with yellow apricot blossom. Tet is full of life and color.

Across the oceans to: I-T-A-L-Y

It is Carnival time in Venice and enjoy the spectacular masks, the music, the ladies and gentlemen draped in elaborate costumes, the parade of gondolas cruising along the canals, St Mark's Square adorned with color, and the partying that sweeps all present into this Festival we call 'Carnivale'.

I predict every Monican of Italian heritage has heard of Carnivale, certainly, every Monican who studies the Italian language at SMC knows it.

We find ourselves in G-R-E-E-C-E

Greece's carnival season is called Apokreas and it precedes the forty days of fasting that leads to Easter. Italy's Carnivale commemorates the same thing. Every night during Apokreas there is feasting; neighbourhoods come alive with dancing and parties. Come and be covered in confetti as you see the children in costume come downtown. Finally, there are magnificent kites flying in the skies throughout the country.

Our Greek students' families may have experienced Apokreas or at least they watch it on television screens here in their homes.

There are many other world festivals which we could have visited, such as Mardi Gras in New York, America and Sydney, Australia; St Patrick's Day in Ireland; the famous tomato throwing experience of La Tomatina in Spain; Sinulog in The Philippines; the Rio Carnival in Brazil; and Taiwan's Lantern Festival. Each festival of many colors represents the color of the culture, the color of the country, the color of the citizens. Color is contagious.

But now, Monicans, we descend, disembark and literally come down to earth. We arrive back in Australia, Victoria, Melbourne, Epping and back to Our School of Many Colors. I could have shown you the colors of Australia too – in fact, here are a few!

What brings us together at this College is not the many countries from which our families come, the different religions, the varying suburbs where we live, our year level or campus. Instead, what does make us whole, unites us powerfully and gently at the same time, is that we are all children of God, whose death and resurrection we have remembered recently at Easter.

God created us in order for us to live happy and holy lives while on earth, and to be with God forever in Heaven after our earthly life ends. This bonds us, gathers us together, entwines and embraces us as a School of Many Colors, and it is the reason we pray and persevere.

I never want to hear any Monican either inside or outside this school, mock, discriminate against, or demean any other person because of their nationality. We do not accept or live like that in our school community.

# Tips for Autism-Friendly and Inclusive Interactions

Continuing on from the Walk for Autism Challenge and Fundraiser that was held in Term 1, it is important to break down the barriers that keep people excluded and provide the best opportunity for people on the autism spectrum to engage, participate and thrive in the world around them. It is up to all of us to adapt our behaviour, perspective and environments to be inclusive of all people. By incorporating these tips into your everyday life, you can help create a better, fairer world for people on the autism spectrum. These tips were developed in conjunction with people on the autism spectrum and adapted from Autism Spectrum Australia.

- Many people on the spectrum find reading social cues and body language very challenging. You can help by being patient and understanding.
- People on the spectrum have the same emotions as everyone else. Treat everyone with dignity and respect.
- Focus on a person's ability, interest and their unique perspective. If you take the time to listen, you may learn some interesting things.
- Sometimes people on the spectrum get overwhelmed by sights, sounds and smells in our surroundings, especially when places are busy. Give people the space and time they need and understand if they need to exit a situation or conversation quickly.
- Sometimes people on the spectrum take words and phrases literally or have trouble reading 'between the lines'. As a result, they may need to clarify (even if this means going back to previous comments). Do not be offended if someone repeats your words back to you they are just making sure they have understood you correctly. To help, keep your communication direct, clear and easy to follow.
- People on the spectrum often interact and communicate differently. Be careful not to judge these differences negatively but focus patiently on the purpose of the communication.
- People on the spectrum can appear very frank, honest and matter of fact. Remember this is often a part of being on the spectrum, and there is no intention to be rude or inappropriate.

Together, we can create a more inclusive world – one step at a time.

### VCAL – Semester One 2019

The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning is a more hands on learning experience. Students are taught Literacy, Numeracy, Personal Development and work-related Skills through innovative teaching practice and, where possible, out of class experiences. Ultimately, we strive for the development of core skills for the workplace, further education and life in general, this means we are never standing still. Each year our program changes to accommodate student interests, student pathways and curriculum development. Here is a snapshot of our VCAL program thus far in to 2019, we have had a busy semester!

Our Pre-VCAL, Year 10 students have spent a considerable amount of time in our vegetable garden as part of their Numeracy Unit. They have practically developed their understanding of measurements, ratios, shape, percentages and scale as they set about planting a winter crop. They are currently working on an exciting Unit focused on driving and the costs of car ownership, including obtaining quotes for car insurance, car parts, and calculations of fuel costs based on consumption data. Students are busy planning and costing their own personal road trip in their dream vehicle. In Literacy, whilst being exposed to a rich variety of Literacy teaching and learning, students are exploring local and global issues of relative poverty and homelessness. This opens up opportunities for working with Whittlesea Tech School later in the year and also with The Exodus Community as part of our Social Justice Program.

On top of this the Year 10 students continue to explore career pathways and employment, through completion of a Certificate I in Employment Pathways. Students spent a productive morning at the Youth Employment and Careers Expo held at Plenty Ranges Arts and Convention Centre. Here they met a number of potential employers and further education providers. Perhaps the highlight of Term One was a trip to YMCA Lake Dewar in March. This was a one day 'camp' whereby students took part in a number of team building and leadership activities such as rafting, flying fox, archery and orienteering as part of a great race initiative. Students were encouraged by five Year 12 'mentors' who went along to offer their support and join in the fun!

Our Year 11 students started 2019 learning about sustainability. We took a trip to CERES Environmental Park in Brunswick to learn about sustainable practice in buildings and horticulture. Back in the classroom, students extrapolated climate data and

applied numerical concepts to analyse global warming. The students are currently in the middle of redesigning the vegetable garden to meet sustainable practices. Students have measured, technically drawn, costed and are to submit design proposals for a Sustainable Refurbishment project which will be carried out in Building and Construction.

Students have been developing their Literacy skills whilst learning about war. With a focus on the two world wars, students took the morning to pay their respects with a visit to the Shrine of Remembrance. This Unit has required students to develop a number of key skills including recount, summarising, analysis and informative writing. Students are now preparing for a debate on the topic of War which will further their communication skills and powers of persuasion.

The Senior VCAL students started their year by once again connecting with the elderly in their local community. As part of their own personal development, students have reached out and spent time, on a roster basis, with the residents of Mercy Place Aged Care in Keon Park. Students have reflected on their mission as Catholics and the importance of care for others. Our students have bought smiles to the faces of the elderly with their presence, their conversation and involvement in games and activities. It has also been a window into the world of Aged Care as a vocation, and the tremendous work that people in that profession undertake.

As part of their Numeracy development, students have been analysing census data, whilst learning about migration patterns in Australia. There has been a focus on core Mathematics and students have been required to complete percentage, five number summaries, graphs and analysis based on ABS Statistics. As a practical extension to learning about cultures, students are in the midst of planning a multi-cultural buffet lunch which they will have planned and costed (in the relevant Exchange Rate) and will serve to staff.

### Careers at St Monica's College



Looking back at Term 1 in the Careers Centre at SMC it is easy to see that students were eager to look at the different options available to them in the post-secondary environment with many taking the opportunity to book early appointments to plan their options.

Year 12 students were surveyed as to their course and careers information needs and from their answers information has been collated and distributed via the fortnightly newsletter and through the St Monica's College Careers Facebook and Twitter accounts. Students have also been encouraged to book early appointments if they are unsure of where subject choices may lead them and many have taken this opportunity and have developed a career plan.

Years 10 - 12 students were also encouraged to take up the options of the 'Experience Days' held during the Term 1 holidays with different institutions so that they could be a post-secondary student for the day and learn more about the career options associated with the various courses.

Years 11 and 12 VCAL students have met individually with the Career Employment Officer to plan future pathway options and to discuss different work placement options that are relevant to the Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses they are studying.

Students at other year levels received their fortnightly newsletter which covers a wide variety of topics and which has embedded links and videos to further information where available. Students are encouraged to follow the social media accounts with their parents to assist with possible 'Career Conversations' in the home environment.

Students at all year levels can book appointments via the Careers Website available through the Student Portal.

In Term 2 all students and parents were invited to attend the 'Course and Careers Expo' on 22 May, 3:30 pm - 5.00 pm in the Sports and Assembly Hall on the Dalton Road Campus. This year we had 25 exhibitors including universities, TAFE institutions, private RTOs, Victorian Police Force representatives and apprenticeship groups. This event provided the opportunity for students and parents to ask questions about course content and possible future pathways.

Year 10 students attended a Career Seminar on the afternoon of the 22 May, during Periods 6 - 7 where they had the opportunity to hear from College alumni about their career journey and what factors helped them to make decisions as a 15-year-old to begin that journey. Students then had the opportunity to visit the Expo before it opened to students and parents from other year levels. Speaking individually with our Expo exhibitors assists students to learn how to begin their course explorations before the subject selection process begins later in the year.

This term our Year 7 and Year 10 students will also each receive a copy of The Good Careers Guide. This guide is a major source of career and training information. It will help students to learn about the world of work and provides descriptions for more than 400 jobs as well as useful tips to help them to navigate the job-search process. Students are encouraged to use the guide as general reading but should also have it available at school for class related careers activities at the request of the subject teachers.

On Wednesday 5 June from 7.00 pm - 8.00 pm Careers staff from the College will be holding an Information Evening for interested parents of students in Years 7 - 9 regarding 'Future Career Trends in the Australian Landscape'. This evening will concentrate on the trends that the Australian Government and employer groups have identified leading up to 2027 and beyond. Future information will be sent to parents closer to the date.

We look forward to working with students both individually and as class groups as they complete their career activities to assist in opening the doors to future career options.
