FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF) 2019 \$225

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper

understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, Veterans Affairs or pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

\$125 for primary school students \$225 for secondary school students.

How to Apply

Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases.

Parents only need to submit an application form in 2019 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2019 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2019.
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (29 January, 2019) or term two (23 April, 2019).

Closing Date:

MOVEMENT INTO and AROUND DAVISSON STREET CAMPUS

IMPORTANT CHANGES TO STUDENTS USING PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Dear Principal,

PVT (Public Transport Victoria) has two exciting changes to help your students access public transport more easily:

PTV Approved School Student ID Passport-line photos accepted for PTV School Student IDs

PTV Approved School Student ID

From Term 1 2019 school students can use a PTV Approved School Student ID to access concession fares and to buy Student Passes.

For a school's ID to be approved by PTV, it must include:

- the school's name
- the student's name
- the student's photo
- an expiry date no later than 28 February of the year after the student finishes Year 12
- the PTV logo

PTV Approved School Student ID cards may include any other information that schools need, provided there is enough space for the PTV logo.

PTV Approved School Student ID cards must be digitally color printed using card printing hardware. Hand-made or laminated cards are not accepted.

The existing PTV Approved School Student ID is still an option for students should your school choose not to participate.

Passport-like photos accepted for PTV School Student IDs

PTV has added flexibility to the student's photo for the PTV School Student ID. The photos must still be identical and colour printed, but can now be any one of the following:

a recent school photo

a photo taken in a photo booth

a photo taken on a smart phone.

'Passport-like' means the image must be:

- of the person's head and shoulders
- front facing
- of only the student (i.e. no other people or items in the image)
- fill most of the frame
- in focus
- not edited or augmented (i.e. using photo editing apps to add filters, effects, etc.).

From 1 January 2019 you can download the 2019 PTV School Student ID and Student Pass application form at ptv.vic.gov.au/students.

Touching on and off

We ask that you regularly remind students to touch on and off every time they use their myki on public transport, even if they have a myki Pass or Student Pass. Apart from sending a positive message to the broader travelling public, we use data from these interactions to plan the level and frequency of services for your school.




Look out for the reduced speed limit around schools and slow down to improve safety.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS




- Look out for flags and Crossing Supervisors.

NO PARKING ON NATURE STRIPS/FOOTPATHS




Parking is illegal on nature strips and footpaths.

YELLOW EDGE LINE




A driver must not stop on the side of a road marked with a yellow edge line.

DOUBLE PARKING





It is illegal to double park at any time. This affects the flow of traffic.
