

JFK – JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY





I recall my mother 'loving' JFK. She saw in him a young, handsome, powerful man, a Catholic who achieved enormous elevation in the world of American politics, and he was a family man with a young, beautiful wife, Jackie, and two young children, Caroline and John Junior. His reign as President, and in my mum's eyes, was like Camelot of the twentieth century.

Personally, I vividly remember being at home early on the Saturday morning (Australian time) when vision came on the black-and-white television of President Kennedy's assassination in Dallas, Texas on Friday, 22 November (American time). It was shattering to see a loved and brave man shot in the head and killed in such tragic circumstances.

What can Monicans learn from John Kennedy, the man and politician? Firstly, being Catholic ought never to hold us back from success and acclaim. Our faith will sustain and strengthen us, be our moral and civic guide, prayer will energise us and the sacraments will be our spiritual food.

Youthfulness should drive us forward, not draw us back because we might be considered too young, naïve, inexperienced or irresponsible. Jesus died in his early thirties, we know of many young Australians who are renowned in their individual field of endeavour (arts, sport, academic etc.), often when we are young are we the most enthusiastic




and idealistic. They are fine qualities.

JFK established the American Peace Corps (existing today) and thus many Americans volunteer in the world in education, health, farming and construction. He encouraged the exploration of space travel – Monicans, reach for the stars! He identified in his inaugural address the common enemies of tyranny, poverty, disease and war. Kennedy was astute and courageous as he confronted the military might of Russia and nuclear war threats; he sought to eradicate racial segregation in public schools; and JFK was always optimistic about the future.

His brutal death that day rocked and shocked the USA and the world. This man who promised so much and was only partially through his delivery of humane and diplomatic aims and accomplishments was dead. With him, so too died the chance for a better, kinder and more equitable world.

Monicans, heed the famous words of President John F. Kennedy during his swearing in as President on 20 January 1961, "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country.' Transfer that sentiment to this school called St Monica's College, Epping, and our future will be endlessly wonderful.

Please note that our country property, Ostia at Strath Creek, is closed until further notice. It will reopen when Government regulations permit.


PUBLIC HOLIDAY

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF) 2020 \$225.00

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, Veteran's Affairs or pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

\$125 for primary school students

\$225 for secondary school students.

How to Apply

Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases. Parents only need to submit an application form in 2019 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2020 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2019
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2020.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either Term 1 (28 January, 2020) or Term 2 (14 April, 2020).

Closing Date

You should lodge a CSEF application form at the school by 26 June, 2020 for eligibility. For more information regarding the CSEF, visit www.educationvic.gov.au/csef
