

250 YEARS ON FROM CAPTAIN JAMES COOK RN

One of the first history lessons most young Australians learn is how Captain James Cook RN landed in Botany Bay on 29 April 1770 and came ashore to discover a new land, a foreign, virgin land save for the indigenous peoples who had resided there in their homeland for probably thousands of years.



Cook was a magnificent sailor, described by historian Geoffrey Blainey as an 'astronaut from the sea'. His expedition in the *Endeavour* vessel set sail from Britain towards the Pacific region of the largely unknown world on 26 August 1768. Cook was to make a total of three significant voyages during his naval lifetime before his assassination in Hawaii on 14 February 1779.



Cook brought back from the Pacific amazing insight and items, and the range of matters were immense: cartography, botanical life, geographical features, knowledge about mathematics and nutrition, astronomy, and languages. The list goes on. James Cook was unique and exceptional, a

brave, wise and enterprising individual.

It was not until eighteen years later that Admiral Arthur Phillip RN, Commander of the First Fleet, declared the land a penal colony for Great Britain.

In relation to the indigenous peoples, many of them, and their fellow Australians, are committed to the belief that their land was stolen from them by the British and that the arrival of Cook and ultimately Arthur Phillip was the start of their cultural degradation.

In this time of learning from home for students, I recommend reading and learning more about the incredible life of Captain James Cook, the

indigenous peoples of Terra Australis, and the original foundation from 1788 that has brought this nation to where it is now in 2020. We need to know a lot about the land which we call home.

So many Monican families made their way to Australia over the generations. Some of us are even first generation immigrants and

new Australians. This cultural diversity is beautifully reflected in our school and each culture brings its own gifts onto the Monican table. We respect, appreciate and celebrate the breadth and diversity of cultures present each day at our school.

It is a critical necessity that in our school a calm and authentic sense of tolerance exists. No race is superior to another; no skin colour is more beautiful than another; no cultural heritage has less value than any other. Our table of life at St Monica's College is wide and has space for all cultural gifts and we admire them, totally and genuinely.

The three headings under which strategies appear are: Purpose, Principles and People; Programs; and Property, Planning and Projects. It will make for important and very fascinating reading.


HEALTHY LIFESTYLE - LAUGHTER
