Students should note that visiting the Library in class time is permitted providing their planner is filled in and signed by the class teacher at the time. Students will be sent back to class if this has not been done correctly.

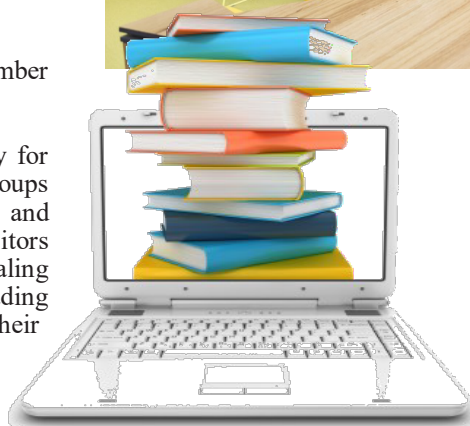

I am pleased to provide you with important information regarding the Tuition Fees and General Levy for this year.

Tuition Fees Accounts, 2023

2023 Tax Invoices were emailed, and a copy sent via the post to all families last week.

Please refer to your emails for fee Statements and Tax Invoices, these will be emailed at the beginning of each month. If you have not received your 2023 Tax Invoice, please contact the Fees Office so that we can update your information.

Please note that fee payments are to commence immediately.

Our Billing cycle is from 17 February to 13 October, 2023. If you are on a school administered payment plan, these dates are not applicable as a further extension until 8 December, 2023 applies.

Payment Options

The College offers a number of payment options to enable parents to meet their fee obligations as follows:

- At reception (Augustine House) – Payments can be made by cash, cheque, EFTPOS or credit card
- Online Payments via the community (fee) portal, or via BPAY
- Direct Debit Payment Plan - (weekly, fortnightly, monthly or quarterly) for parents that would like to enter into a Payment Plan option will have a further extension to pay up to 8 December 2023 and have not completed the necessary authorisation forms, please contact our Finance office to arrange, together with all other queries.

Financial assistance for Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF) 2023 \$225.00

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, veterans affairs or pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

\$125 for primary school students

\$225 for secondary school students.

How to Apply

Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases.

Parents only need to submit an application form in 2023 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2023 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2022
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2023.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (**30 January, 2023**) or term two (**24 April, 2023**).

Closing Date

You should lodge a CSEF application form at the school by 23 June, 2023 for eligibility. For more information about the CSEF visit www.educationvic.gov.au/csef

We also welcome Miss Parisi in the administrative assistant role, as she replaces Mrs Martin who will be taking leave. Our 3 "new" staff, as well as Mr Stehn, Mrs Maloney and Mr White look forward to working with both DRC and DSC students to assist them as they explore the many career pathways options available to them.

For the first 2 weeks of the year, Year 12 students are required to attend a Goal Setting meeting with a careers staff member to discuss their goals and possible career pathway options. Last year's Year 12 students responded well to the interviews, and we found that many of them were then eager to make careers appointments to find out more about the career possibilities available to them.

We look forward to a year that will provide many opportunities for students at both DRC and DSC to explore the world of work. The pathways to work may be through vocational education which typically entails more hands-on and experiential work. It may/should also involve experiencing the workplace while still a school student and then moving on to TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship, or employment.

The pathway to work may also be an academic pathway which would typically mean university study before gaining the qualification(s) required to enter specific professions. The requirements to access tertiary study options are often changing, so it pays to keep up to date with the latest information. Students are encouraged to attend seminars, workshops, information sessions, universities, careers appointments, to ensure they have relevant and reliable information to assist good decision making. Many of these information gathering opportunities will be provided to students throughout 2023.

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) is a requirement for students who undertake the VCE VM course in their senior years. SWL would typically be done in the area of a student's VET study. SWL is also "strongly recommended" for all VET students in the VCE program. It is a little more difficult to organise, but we continue to encourage VCE students to undertake a SWL. Other work opportunities which we are happy to facilitate include work experience and School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SBATS) if appropriate.

Careers staff are excited to have more access to curriculum time to allow us to deliver valuable career education. We also have more incursions and excursion planned that students will be given an opportunity to attend.

Be sure to access the Careers Newsletter each fortnight. Don't miss out on all the advertised part time job opportunities, the STEM corner, the 'job spotlight', university updates, upcoming events information, etc.

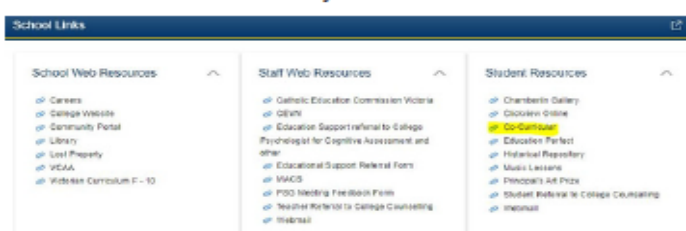

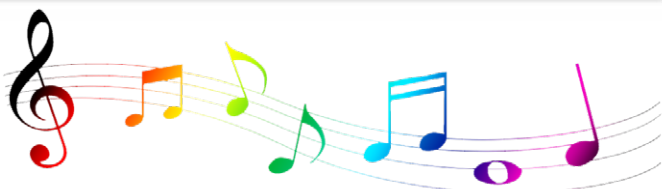

Circular to principals of Catholic schools in Victoria

Actions to prevent mosquito-borne diseases

Main Points

- Warm and wet weather can result in greater numbers of mosquitoes and increased risk of illnesses from their bites. The best protection against mosquito-borne illness is to avoid mosquito bites.
- There is an increased risk of mosquito-borne diseases in Victoria this season due to the recent flooding events in northern parts of the state and ongoing environmental conditions that support mosquito breeding.
- Mosquito-borne diseases that can occur in Victoria include Japanese encephalitis and Murray Valley encephalitis. These rare but potentially serious infections of the brain can cause neurological complications and death.
- The Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd (CECV) has worked with the departments of Health and Education to develop [health advice](#) that outlines the key steps schools are asked to take to protect against mosquito bites.

Actions Required

- Schools are encouraged to follow the CECV [health advice](#), and share the [template newsletter content](#) with parents and carers.
