In the following three editions of the Principal's Bulletin we shall discover and reflect upon the Arts and how our voice, our movement and our theatrical performances can give great praise, glory and worship to our Creator God. These are truly effective and creative means through which we can 'Let our Light Shine Bright' whilst enjoying ourselves as we honor God.

This edition concentrates on song. People generally believe that either they can sing and thus do so with great gusto and meaning or they bemoan the fact that they possess no or very little talent to evoke any sense of music or tune from their vocal cords. No matter!

Singing is a splendid way to praise God. Our own beloved Saint Augustine wrote that 'Singing is praying twice over.' Spoken word versus melodic lyrics

in praise of God. Clear aural comparisons can be made easily.

Singing has always been a part of religion across most faiths and denominations. The Bible contains a specific book entitled 'Song of Songs' and just for a moment recall the beautiful singing you have heard from a choir or person singing in a spiritual environment.

Deeply felt spiritual hymns are a part of the way certain people from many countries praise God, and I have been fortunate to attend a Baptist Church in New York one Sunday morning and been carried away by the glorious power of the sung prayer.

A journey around the world in search of song in praise of a divine entity reveals a multitude of different genres. African tribal songs are colorful and active; songs sung in cathedrals in Europe are profound, often very old and they capture the spirit of the year whether it is Christmas and Easter, Lent or Advent. Evangelical Hillsong worshippers love singing to God, healers draw down God's power through song, songs capture so many different moods ranging from grief and sadness to joy and youthful vitality.

We proclaim the Gospel (the Word of God) through song. We retell biblical passages through sung responsorial psalms at Mass, and we are all taken by the traditionally well-known hymns such as Amazing Grace, How Great Thou Art and Ave Maria.

At SMC we love and give thanks to our choirs and musicians who lead us in song. We are equally enthralled by the soloist, chorister and the choir assembled. A rapturous recessional song after a Mass is truly a College community praying twice as we sing loud, maybe clap our hands, tap our feet, smile as we sing, and sing in harmony.

We treasure our College hymn Together in Freedom and Love and our own Hymn to St Monica. They are uniquely and essentially Monican.

Welcome to Term 2

Term 2 signals the change over from Summer Uniform into Winter Uniform. Thank you to all Monicans and parents for the smooth transition as we returned to campuses on Monday 24 April. A courteous reminder that only College Uniform articles as listed in the Student Planner are permitted. Additional items such as hoodies, visible apparel (long sleeve tops under short sleeves, non-College scarves, beanies, or gloves etc.) are not to be worn with the uniform at any time. This includes whilst wearing the College PE Uniform. Failure to adhere to this requirement, will result in the confiscation of non-College approved attire.

Full tracksuits (jacket and pants) are required for all students completing PE Studies. As always, PE uniform is only permitted on days when practical lessons are scheduled. Shorts other than for PE lessons or Sport commitments, are not permitted during Terms 2 and 3. This also applies to senior studies students wearing Building and Construction Uniforms.

As we prepare to move towards colder Winter days, students and families are encouraged to source appropriate garments to be worn under required uniform articles, that cannot be seen.

Your support in ensuring that your child is appropriately groomed at all times, during the College terms, is greatly appreciated.



Concerns on Vaping

Over recent months, there has been a growing concern about the effects of vaping or e-cigarettes on young people. As this activity grows in popularity, most teenagers are unaware of the associated risks and the potential impact vaping can have on their development and overall health.

Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapour created by an electronic cigarette, or e-cigarette. These are lithium battery — powered devices that often look like highlighters or USB's. Vaping is often marketed as being the "healthy" alternative to smoking. Although the long-term impacts of vaping are still largely unknown, looking at the health impacts of smoking cigarettes should provide insight on the effects of nicotine exposure. Vaping products are infused with enticing flavours, many contain high levels of nicotine as well as other chemicals and additives, that when inhaled, can cause severe damage to the lungs.

Australia has strict regulations in place for products containing nicotine and despite it being illegal to use, sell or buy nicotine for use in e-cigarettes, users are purchasing these products through other avenues.

Current research shows vaping is common amongst teenagers. It also tells us that young people understand that vaping is unsafe and unhealthy. A single vape can contain as much nicotine as ten packets of cigarettes. Additionally, research suggests that vaping can cause lung injury, cardiovascular disease, respiratory infections, other serious negative effects including on brain development and the immune system.

From a school perspective we aim to empower young people to know they can refuse to vape. This includes ways of saying 'no' without being singled out and understanding the impact on their health.

2023 Tuition Fees and Payment Options

We hope that your family had a restful school break and are settling well into Term 2. The College requires all families to meet their fee commitments so we may continue to provide the highest level of education to our students. The College offers a number of payment options to enable parents to meet their fee obligations:

- a) School Administered Payment Plan (weekly, fortnightly, monthly or quarterly) Parents that would like to enter into a payment plan will have a further extension to pay up to 8 December, 2023
- b) At Reception (Augustine House) Payments can be made by cash, cheque, EFTPOS or credit card
- c) Online Payments via the community (fee) portal, or via BPAY.

Should you decide not to sign up for a school administered payment plan, please keep in mind that payments are due and payable in four equal instalments by the second week of each term:

- Instalment 1 − 17 February 2023
- Instalment 2 − 5 May 2023
- Instalment 3 21 July 2023
- Instalment 4 13 October 2023.

A requirement of enrolling your child at St Monica's College is that payments are made on a regular basis from the commencement of the school year. Tuition Account Statements are being sent via email shortly. *Extra-curricular activities* will not appear on your Tuition Account Statement, these charges will be billed via a separate Tax Invoice as and when they fall due, whereby different terms and conditions apply.

Payment Plans

We would like to remind families that it is never too late to sign up for a school administered payment plan. St Monica's College offers both Direct Debit and Credit Card payment options. Extended tuition account due dates are in place for families on a St Monica's College school administered payment plan.

Application forms for Direct Debit or Credit Card can be completed online using the following link: https://www.stmonicas-epping.com/payment-plan/ or can be completed in person at College Reception at Augustine House (400 Dalton Road, Epping VIC 3076). Should you choose to sign up to a school administered payment plan, you will be opted- in for future years unless you choose to opt-out.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) 2023 \$225.00

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational, and fun activities. School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum. CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, veterans' affairs card, pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child. The annual CSEF amount is \$225 for secondary school students. To apply, contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef and lodge together with a copy of your valid concession card.

Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in <u>most cases</u>. Parents only need to submit an application form in 2023 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2023 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2022
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2023.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either Term 1 (30 January, 2023) or Term 2 (24 April, 2023).

Closing Date

CSEF applications can be lodged at Augustine House, Dalton Road Campus on or before 23 June, 2023 for eligibility as no late applications will be accepted by DEET after this date. 9 STEM Whittlesea Tech School Excursion

Recently our Year 9 STEM class attended an excursion to Whittlesea School. The hands-on experience provided a fantastic opportunity for our students to delve deeper into the world of STEM and develop essential transferable skills, such as critical thinking and design thinking, which are invaluable in solving real-world problems.

During the excursion, students engaged in the Design Thinking process by empathising with a


United Nations Sustainable Development Goal and defining a problem that needs attention. This set the stage for brainstorming and developing ideas for potential solutions, allowing our students to truly immerse themselves in the problemsolving process.

The excursion also enabled our students to develop iterations for the prototyping stage through Skill-Up Master Classes in Computer-Aided Design (CAD) and Advanced Manufacturing. They were introduced to various programs and equipment for prototyping, beginning with low-resolution iterations using cardboard before progressing to high-resolution prototypes with 3D printers, laser cutters, and micro: bits.

The time spent at Whittlesea Tech School has undoubtedly inspired our students to further explore and pursue STEM-related fields. We witnessed an incredible display of creativity, collaboration, and enthusiasm as they tackled the challenges presented to them.







STEM Co-curricular Activities





STEM Co-curricular Activities are running every lunch time in the STEM Centre. These include STEM: Makers, Robotics, Solar Vehicle Challenge and Coding Clubs as well as our inaugural Astrophotography, Sneakerhead and GPS (Girls Pursuing STEM) Club launches. Offering an exciting opportunity for students to participate in programs which provide a platform to enhance their technical and enterprise skills while participating in STEM-based activities and projects.

This year, students will form teams and choose a project to develop and display in the STEM Showcase exhibition at the end of the year.

This will not only allow students to engage with various technologies on-site in the STEM Centre but also help them develop communication, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking and leadership skills. These 21st Century skills are developed as students network across year levels and enables them to become future workforce leaders.

Dear Parents/Guardians & Carers.


If you have a child presently in Grade 6 and have not yet enrolled into St Monica's College for Year 7, 2024 please do so immediately as places are limited.

Application for enrolment is available on the St Monica's College Website www.stmonicas-epping.com/apply. Click on the apply button to complete your online form and submit with documentation required.


