

FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL


Conduct

We often hear recounts from staff who are stopped by retail assistants or others in the community, on their travels to or from work, wearing their College lanyard or other identifying items, and many go on to relay anecdotes of knowing someone associated with the College or indeed, of being an alumna themselves. This is always a great thing to hear, especially if the association is made with fondness due to positive prior experiences or interactions, with members of the College community.

Unfortunately, at times, such recounts can also include negative commentary about observations made when our students are not representing themselves, their school, or their families appropriately. It is important to remember that our College reputation, is precisely that – ours. We, staff, students, and families are collectively responsible for how we are considered in the wider community. The language we use and how we interact, the way we present ourselves and the actions we take or fail to enact, are all under the watchful eyes of potential employers, leaders, transport operators, authorities, shopping centre management staff, prospective new families for the College, and many, many others. Our online conduct is equally important in this digital age where a footprint remains long after a heated comment or inappropriate message has been posted.

As members of the St Monica's College, Epping community, we must ensure that the expectations and high standards required of us during the normal course of the school day, are also adhered to before and after school when we are representing our school beyond the gates, unquestionably identified with the pin, uniform, and cross that unite us and that we proudly wear as members of our Monican community.



Student Movement to and from the College

We encourage parents and guardians to engage in conversations with their children about safe and responsible movement to and from the College.

As a College, we work closely with local authorities to support the needs and address the behavior of our students. To protect the safety of young people, the Whittlesea Council has recently installed a metal barrier at the corner of Dalton Road and Cooper Street. This is due to the heavy pedestrian traffic crossing here in the morning and afternoons. The barrier is designed to ensure students are able to safely cross the road on their way to and from school. Further to this, our students that catch public transport home are encouraged to move safely from College grounds to Epping Station, ensuring they follow direction of crossing supervisors.





We take this opportunity to remind all members of our community that traveling on public transport without a valid MYKI card is not permitted. We have received the following correspondence from Metro Trains:

Dear Parents and Students,

A recent survey of the morning peak passengers exiting Epping Railway Station found that the vast majority of St Monica's College students were not in possession of valid MYKI tickets. We kindly remind you that it is an offence to travel without a valid MYKI ticket and encourage all students to ensure they are in possession of a valid MYKI ticket when using Public Transport.

If found without a valid MYKI ticket students may face penalties of up to \$277.

Tuition Fee Account Statements were emailed to all families on Monday, 5 June 2023. If you did not receive a copy of this statement, please contact our Fees Office at 9409-8800.

Additional Charges invoices/ statements for extra-curricular activities were emailed to relevant families on Wednesday, 1 June 2023. Extra-curricular activities do not appear on your Tuition Account Statement, these charges are billed via a separate Tax Invoice as and when they fall due, and different terms and conditions apply.

To view a copy of these statements or prior statements, you can find record of these on the Community Portal. You can access the Community Portal to make your deposit payment using the following steps:

- 1. Go to the St Monica's College website.
- 2. Choose the MY SMC tab.
- 3. Choose "Community Portal" link and enter your username and password:
- 4. Select the Finance Tab.
- 5. From the drop-down box, choose to view your Tuition or your Additional Charges history.
- 6. Select the PDF icon to download file.

Tips to Stay on top of your School Fees

Staying on top of Tuition fees is essential to ensure a smooth academic journey, it can however feel daunting at times.

Please find some tips & tricks to making this journey as seamless as possible:

- Sign up for a school administered payment plan: Your payment plan will be opted into for future years until your child graduates and fees are finalised. You have the choice to sign up for a quarterly, monthly, fortnightly, or weekly plan. You are able to opt out of a payment plan at any time
- Make note of Deadlines: Tuition Fees payments are due and payable in four equal instalments by the second week of each term. Should you opt to pay more frequent instalments, this is welcome. Note, if you have not paid a second instalment on your tuition fees account, this is now considered overdue
- Keep up to date: Most correspondence is sent via email so please ensure that you check your email regularly for communication as well as the latest Principal's Bulletins.

Most importantly the Fees office is here to assist you in any way we can, please do not hesitate to reach out to talk to one of our knowledgeable staff.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) 2023 \$225.00

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational, and fun activities. CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, veterans' affairs card, pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child. The annual CSEF amount is \$225 for secondary school students.

To apply, contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef and lodge together with a copy of your valid concession card. Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases. Parents only need to submit an application form in 2023 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2023 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2022
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2023.

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (30 January, 2023) or term two (24 April, 2023).

Closing Date

CSEF applications can be lodged at Augustine House, Dalton Road Campus on or before 23 June, 2023 for eligibility as no late applications will be accepted by DEET after this date. Subject Selection


Early next term Year 9 students will be selecting their subjects for Year 10. They will receive quite a lot of information about this at the start of the term. They will also undertake some classes about subject selection when they have their pastoral lessons. In general students should choose subjects that they currently enjoy and which they are good at. Students should also consider whether they need certain subjects for their envisaged career pathway, too. The biggest decision most students will face is regarding which Maths subject they choose and which Science subject (s) they choose. Only those who study Maths A or above in Year 10 will be able to study Methods and/or Specialist in their VCE. Maths A is therefore called a "prerequisite" for Methods and Specialist. Only those students who study Physical Science in Year 10 satisfy the prerequisite to study Physics and/or Chemistry in VCE, for example.

Subject Selection

In early term three, Year 10 students (and Year 9's) will also choose their subjects for next year – the beginning of their VCE. These students should choose subjects they enjoy and are good at, mindful of any prerequisites for tertiary-level courses.

Both the Year 9 and 10 cohorts will be shown how to research prerequisites for university courses using a website called, <u>Course Seeker</u> to help them with this aspect. They will be reminded that the idea of choosing subjects such as Maths Specialist or Physics in the belief that they get "scaled up" and will lead to a higher ATAR is false. In fact, this "strategy" is very likely to lead to a lower overall ATAR if the subject doesn't match the student's abilities and interests. Instead, students should choose subjects that they enjoy and for which they have shown ability.


The students were then given the opportunity to try their skills as he mingled and offered advice and suggestions.



Celebrating the Success of Our Year 7 DigiSTEM Students in the Pedometer Project



Our Year 7 DigiSTEM students have recently demonstrated their impressive knowledge and skills in the exciting pedometer project. These enthusiastic students have not only showcased their understanding of step counters but also applied this knowledge to real-world scenarios, proving their abilities in the realm of STEM.

In STEM Leader, Mr Bagh's class, our students exhibited a firm grasp of the pedometer's functionality. They provided detailed definitions and even delved into the distinction between a step and a stride when calculating walking distance. Their understanding extended to the application of formulas for steps, stride, and speed, impressively employing these concepts in practical situations.

Students, Jamie Vogdanis and Aarav Kamboj effectively explained the difference between mass and weight and skilfully applied the kinetic energy calculation to a real-world scenario their understanding of this scientific concept was truly commendable.

Jamie shared his experiences working on the project, highlighting valuable lessons in problem-solving, speed units, and self-reliance. He also discussed how the project incorporated mathematics, working with graphs and speed calculations based on distance and time. Additionally, all students gained knowledge in Digital Technologies, developing programming algorithms and coding to accurately measure speed and distance. They collected and presented accurate data using an Excel spreadsheet and recorded their observations and produced a graph, demonstrating their commitment to scientific integrity.

Mr McQuade, Faculty Leader, Digital Technologies noted that "students embraced the opportunity to apply their learning and discover the connections between Science, Digital Technologies and Mathematics".

Overall, our Year 7 STEM students have truly embraced the pedometer project, their impressive understanding, skills, and attention to detail are commendable. We eagerly anticipate witnessing their future endeavours in the captivating world of STEM. Well done, Year 7!
