Easter Blessings to all Monicans

We are approaching Easter Sunday, the greatest day in the calendar year for Christians. On this special day, Christians shout, 'Alleluia, He is Risen' as they commemorate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace.

In 2022, Easter Sunday is celebrated on Sunday, 17 April, and I extend Easter blessings to all members of our Monican community. Easter Sunday is the culmination of the Easter journey which starts next Sunday with Palm Sunday, followed later in the week by the Easter Triduum which commences on Holy Thursday at the Last Supper, extends into Good Friday when the Lord is crucified, and onto Sunday when the rock is gone revealing the empty tomb. 'Alleluia, He is Risen'.


Easter is the sure sign of salvation for all Christian believers. The Resurrection of Jesus was His conquering the power of evil and death and opening the gates of Heaven. Our faith teaches us that Heaven does exist and is the eternal reward after our life on earth has finished. The original sin of Adam and Eve and evil satanic forces were wiped away with the Resurrection. New, eternal life reigns: death is conquered forever.

In Australia today, people celebrate Easter through various means. Many who do not belong to the Christian faith recognise its importance through national holidays in the Easter weekend. The forty days of Lent have ended; the Passion of the Lord has been experienced by Him and remembered by us; the lifeless body of Jesus hung on the cross, was removed to a tomb, and on Easter morning the Lord emerged victorious and alive. Church services are to the fore during the days of Easter as the journey of Jesus is commemorated through attendance at Mass, prayers, music, and ancient beautiful liturgies.

On the other hand, the season is recognised in the wider community through nonreligious practices and what a collection of oddities some are. Think for a moment what happens at Easter: the arrival of the Easter Bunny with chocolate eggs; Hot Cross Buns consumed on Good Friday; camping expeditions; household tasks tackled; heightened football matches are played; parades occur with people donning Easter bonnets; the Good Friday Appeal for the Royal Children's Hospital is an annual event; many families still gather for a family meal at Easter; and others observe the tradition of abstaining from meat on Good Friday.

Those matters are all fine, no harm there. However, the richness, spirituality, sheer joy, and the praise to God on High are equally important for Christians. These can never be underestimated, they are Christian traditions and beliefs, our special features that all religions observe in their own manner.







For Monicans, the feast of Easter in 2022 will occur in the school holidays. I extend best wishes to all and hope that the fortnight (followed by Anzac Day on 25 April) is a time for renewal and relaxation.

The journey we travelled in Term 1 was often uncomfortable, unpleasant, and difficult. For many it was made worse by illness. I thank every Monican for the effort put into making the first term bearable, sustainable, and yes, happy for so many. God bless our Monican community.

UNIFORM AND GROOMING

At St Monica's College we pride ourselves on our uniform standards. Our uniform and grooming expectations ensure that Monicans are well presented in the community, taking pride in themselves and the College they represent.

All students return for Term 2 in Winter Uniform.

For girls:

- Regulation wool blend St Monica's skirt worn on or below the knee, in blue, grey and gold check, with grey tights (2TT's brand- light grey) - no socks permitted
- <u>OR</u> Regulation wool blend St Monica's trousers, in blue, white and gold stripe, worn with plain navy or black socks. No short tennis style anklet socks
- White, long-sleeved, peter-pan collar school shirt
- Blue scoop-necked jumper, embroidered with College emblem
- Pure wool, lined blazer with College emblem on pocket
- Plain black lace-up school shoes without silver or any colour eyelets
- Grey College scarf, beanie and grey gloves (optional). No other items are permitted.

For boys:

- White peaked collar regulation shirt (Fairmark or Midford), long or short-sleeved, buttoned to the neck
- Regulation mid-grey school trousers with grey or black socks
- Regulation black leather belt with plain buckle
- Blue scoop-necked jumper, embroidered with College emblem
- Pure wool, lined blazer with College emblem on pocket
- Plain black lace-up school shoes without silver or any colour eyelets
- College Tie
- Grey College scarf, beanie and grey gloves (optional). No other items are permitted.



THE VALUE OF WORK EXPERIENCE

Students in Years 10, 11 and 12 can apply to complete one week of work experience during allocated times. Students benefit from these short-term industry placements, gaining more understanding of the working life, and specific careers.

Year 10 Pre-VCAL students will undertake work experience during mid-year, and end of year exam period. Their first placements will run from 30 May – 10 June. Miss Maloney and Careers Department staff have been working with the students to prepare them for their placements. These students are very excited as they anticipate going out into the workplaces.

All payment options will remain available during this time:

a) Direct Debit Payment Plans (Recommended) – If you are on a School Administered payment plan, please make note of your 2022 Direct Debit schedule for any outlying dates over the Easter long weekend.

If you are not already on a school administered payment plan, you are invited to contact the Fees Office to receive the application form. This form will authorise the College to automatically debit from your nominated bank account or credit card account on a Weekly, Fortnightly, Monthly or Quarterly basis. For all families that opt into a payment plan an additional extension to pay school fees until 9 December 2022 will apply.

- b) At College Reception (Augustine House) Payments can be made by cash, cheque, EFTPOS, Visa or Mastercard between the hours of 9:00am and 4:00pm.
- c) Online Payments via the community portal (located in the Finance tab, Fees) or via Bpay.

Finalising Term 1

As we have now approached the end of Term 1, we kindly remind families of their fee obligations.

It is a requirement of the College that you make regular payments throughout the school year, due by the second week of each Term. If you have not made an instalment on your Tuition account at this stage, we ask that you please attend to this.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF) 2022 \$225.00

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, veterans' affairs or pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

\$125 for primary school students \$225 for secondary school students.

How to Apply:

Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases

Parents only need to submit an application form in 2022 if any of these changes have occurred.

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2022 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2021
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2022.

Eligibility Date:

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (31 January, 2022) or term two (26 April 2022).

Closing Date

You should lodge a CSEF application form at the school by 24 June, 2022 for eligibility. For more information about the CSEF visit www.educationvic.gov.au/csef

If you have a child presently in Grade 6 and have not yet enrolled into St Monica's College for Year 7, 2023 please do so immediately as places are limited.


Applications for Grade 5 students starting Year 7 in 2024 are now open and will close on 19 August 2022.
