

Fish are amazing creatures and the discussions that could be held about their complexities, benefit to humankind, their unique characteristics and their life cycles are infinite. Fish must reside in the protection of the waters created by God, waters that humans need to keep clean if sea life is to survive and thrive. We ought to respect the habitats of fish.

Fish have been created and they evolve in so many different forms, making them intriguing companions on their and our life journeys. Humans stand in awe of their complexities and diversities. For instance, we have the huge whales that dominate the oceans and thrill humans as we watch their annual migrations. 2023 Payment Plans

St Monica's College will continue to offer both Direct Debit and Credit Card payment options in 2023. If you are currently on a 2022 Payment Plan, this will be carried over into 2023 with no further action required.

Application forms for Direct Debit or Credit Card can be collected from College Reception at Augustine House (400 Dalton Road, Epping VIC 3076), alternatively this can now also be completed online using the link: https://www.stmonicas-epping.com/payment-plan/

If you choose the payment plan option, your school fees account can be paid by way of Weekly, Fortnightly, Monthly or Quarterly payments via a

nominated Credit Card or Bank Account. Please note, some payments may fall on a public holiday, therefore these payments will be deducted the business day prior.

Extended tuition account due dates are in place for families on a St Monica's College school administered payment plan.

2022 Tuition Fees

We would like to kindly thank those families that have paid their 2022 Tuition Fees. If you are not on a school administered payment plan, we would like to remind families that any remaining Tuition Fees are now considered overdue. A requirement of enrolling your child at St Monica's College is that payments are made on a regular basis from the commencement of the school year.

Extra-curricular activities will not appear on your Tuition Account Statement, these charges will be billed via a separate Tax Invoice as and when they fall due, whereby different terms and conditions apply.

Finalising 2022 Tuition Fees

The College requires all families to meet their fee commitments so we may continue to provide the highest level of education to our students. The College offers a number of payment options to enable parents to meet their fee obligations:

- a. School Administered Payment Plan (Weekly, Fortnightly, Monthly or Quarterly) Parents/ Guardians are reminded that it is not too late to sign up for a payment plan to get a further extension to pay up to 9 December, 2022.
- b. At College Reception (Augustine House) Payments can be made by cash, cheque, EFTPOS or credit card.
- c. Online Payments via the community (fee) portal, or via BPAY.

The SJQL Beyond the Book








Science Engineering Mathematics (STEM) Inquiry in Aviation

The success of the rover landing prototype challenge by students in Year 9 Science motivated Ms Heather Newby (Science Teacher) and Mr Andres Toledo (STEM Educator) to further their students. Critical Thinking. The teachers decided to put together an inquiry and problembased challenge through the activity of flying an aircraft (Aviation). In this inquiry project, students the work collaboratively to build a model aircraft and test its flying capacity using a Centrifugal Thrust Generator (CTG) powered by a single or twin engine. A CTG simulates a flight path using 13-18 voltage of electricity to power the aircraft models. After the students build their basic model, they focus their skills and knowledge to solve a problem posed by both their teachers. The students consistently measure and collect data and then use Critical Thinking to inform their next prototypes. Thereby going through the process of analysis, design, development, and testing. The aircraft models will undergo several modifications to achieve the desired results. Every scientific experiment or inquiry does not always succeed and through this iteration process the Year 9 Science students are able to recognise the areas of improvement. As the students navigate through real-world problems they continue to demonstrate vital as Critical Creativity, skills such Thinking, Teamwork, Communication and, most importantly, how STEM knowledge and skills can be applied to and transferred from one discipline into another.


