### **OUTSIDE OUR CITIES – RURAL LIFE**



In 1999, after several years of looking around and inspecting rural properties, I was fortunate to purchase our Ostia property for our College. Situated in the tranquil valley of Strath Creek in Central Victoria, close to the townships of Broadford on one side, Yea on the other, and neighbour to Flowerdale, our Ostia property has given enormous pleasure, spiritual formation and peace to thousands of Monicans since its acquisition.

We who reside in the city do well to think positively about fellow Australians who live in country towns, rural cities, or on farms and on other landholdings. It is said that Australia rides on the sheep's back (perhaps not so relevant in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century), but certainly our food supplies and basic needs such as milk, wheat, and other crops are sourced from the country.

Let us be thankful that Australians still remain on the land either farming cattle, dairy, grain crops. Other Aussies live in more remote areas where mining pursuits occur, and we do know that our mining resources have most probably replaced that humble sheep!

It breaks our heart, does it not, when we see extreme devastation happening to country areas through droughts, floods and fire. These natural disasters become part of life for country people on a semi-regular basis, and the consequences are severe for families and their economic wellbeing. Water is a most precious commodity for the farmer and river management is a hot political issue. Climate change is often blamed as the cause for disasters.

Country people are sometimes isolated on vast country and mining estates and fields. Others are working in the fishing industry off shore. Travel distances are lengthy, social contact and medical availability can be a

real challenge. We know that the opportunity to attend religious services is often curtailed due to distances. Employment opportunities in the country can be very limited for young people.

Yet, country life (aka 'the bush') is such a beautiful thing. Hard to deny that the air is cleaner, the life is somewhat slower, traditional country friendliness is a reality, that communities tend to be more supportive, aware of their communal needs, and just that bit more determined to make a go of life despite the hardships.



May Monicans pray for our fellow country Australians wherever they live and whatever they produce; may our daily practices reduce climate damage for the sake of those on the land; may we be generous in recovery efforts after disasters; and may all Australians come together — city, country, farmer, miner, indigenous, migrant, Liberal, Labor, National, Green supporter, people of all faiths and none to ensure that we have — ANYWHERE YOU GO.



# <u>Financial assistance for Camps, Sports</u> & Excursions Fund (CSEF) 2021 \$225.00 Extended until 13 August, 2021



Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card, veterans affairs or pension card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

\$125 for primary school students \$225 for secondary school students.

#### Accepting applications

Parents (including guardians) no longer need to submit a new application form each year in most cases.

Parents only need to submit an application form in 2020 if any of these changes have occurred.

 New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2021 or if the parent did not apply for CSEF at the school in 2020.

Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2021.

#### **Eligibility Date**

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (27 January, 2021), term two (19 April, 2021) or term three (12 July, 2021).

#### **Closing Date**

#### **ProgComp 2021 University of New South Wales**



Late in Term 2, during the Semester 1 Examination James Matthew (Year) solely competed prestigious Open Coding competition hosted virtually by the University of New South Wales. This annual competition required Matthew to solve problems that is virtually impossible to solve manually. Matthew had 120 minutes to complete five tasks with increasing complexity. He applied Mathematics, Science, and other knowledge areas to write software code that solved the given problems. Matthew finished 1st in Victoria for the Intermediate Level with an overall ranking of 38th out of 175 participating school teams. He ranks 4<sup>th</sup> overall in the Intermediate Level and 3<sup>rd</sup> overall from participating Victorian teams to be only beaten by two Senior teams from Victorian schools. Matthew competed under the banner 'SMC\_Shalom' to beat senior teams from Melbourne High, Presbyterian Ladies' College, Caulfield College,

Grammar, Cobram Grammar, Brighton Grammar and other Grammar schools from different states.

Matthew James is commended and congratulated for his achievement in taking St Monica's College, Epping to our highest ranking in one of the most challenging coding.

#### **ACU Guarantee Program**

Guarantee your place at ACU, even before your Year 12 exams. The ACU Guarantee program offers eligible Year 12 students a place at ACU based on your Year 11 results.

With the considerable challenges Year 12 students have been facing this year, ACU has introduced the ACU Guarantee program. Students can make an application through this program, have their Year 11 results considered, and ACU will produce a predicted selection rank and make a <u>conditional early offer</u> before final exams have been sat. #### **Aspire – Early Admissions Program**

At La Trobe, we believe there is more to being a good student than marks alone.

The Aspire program rewards the skills and knowledge students gain from the positive impact they have made on their school or community through community service or volunteerism.

Successful applicants also receive their early conditional offer in September for their chosen course along with minimum ATAR requirements. Many courses have a minimum ATAR of 50, but some professional degree programs have higher requirements. Up to 40 Aspire scholarships, worth \$5,000 per year for up to four years, will be awarded to leading eligible Aspire students.

#### **Early Entry Program**


A different way to enter university that will not depend on your ATAR

# **CHESS**

## WHAT IS IT?

Chess Club is a weekly opportunity for students on both campuses to learn and play the game of chess, with a focus on participation, enjoyment, and improvement. Chess is a game in which young people can develop important social skills and critical thinking skills.

On Monday afternoons, students are given a group coaching lesson from Tim Broome, our external coach from Northern Star Chess. Two coaching lessons are provided each session: one for beginner/intermediate players and one for more advanced players. The remainder of the session is allocated to students playing games of chess so that they can develop their skills and put into practice the learnings from the coaching session. Coaching lessons range from fundamental chess concepts and piece development through to recognising tactical opportunities and specific opening and endgame theory.

Chess Club is the gateway for students to represent St Monica's College at intra-school and interschool chess events, such as SACCSS Chess and The Principal's Shield for Chess. Our Senior and Junior Chess Squads regularly compete with great success at state and national level and develop friendships that are maintained through their high school years.
